

GIS Internship: Land Trust Mapping

Summary: La Plata Open Space Conservancy (LPOSC) is seeking a GIS Intern to assist with creating and updating standardized maps and GIS data files for our conserved properties. This position will also provide LPOSC staff with GIS support on various projects related to the stewardship of conserved lands. This position provides an opportunity to gain valuable professional development and enhance a GIS skillset while getting paid.

Responsibilities:

- Use ArcMap 10.8 (provided) or ArcGIS Pro (if desired; not provided) to update standardized photo point maps and corresponding KMZ files for our conserved properties by creating X,Y points from pre-existing CSV files.
- Cross-check our current GIS portfolio with individual conservation easement exhibit maps and county parcel data, flag potential inconsistencies and make edits as requested.
- Ensure accuracy of LPOSC's portfolio of GIS data for property boundaries.
- Provide project support to LPOSC as requested.

Timeline: One intern will complete at least 50 hours, with potential for more hours, between October 3 and December 30.

- Gain professional development experience while building your GIS skillset in a realworld setting.
